ANNUAL REPORT

Each year we have been faced with many challenges that result from a declining student population and the current decline in funding from the state level. Local revenue, which makes up 83% of our \$7,916 dollar per pupil funding (compared with \$8,386 in 2011) has been stable, but Lansing has continued to cut their 17% share that was slated for educating K-12 students. Despite the reduction of state allocation we have done our best to maintain programs and stay on top in the region in relation to student achievement. These achievements have been much more difficult with less staff and increased class sizes. Our staff, students, parents and community should be commended for maintaining high standards and attaining excellent results with diminished resources.

Our state superintendent Mike Flanagan states in a July 8, 2013 letter to the Appropriations Subcommittees on K-12 Education his belief in a local and intermediate school realignment providing administrative efficiencies and a better ability to utilize state funding. This realignment would better absorb enrollment fluctuations and a more

equitable education for all students. Our local districts have had the same discussions for over a year and can attest to some of the transitions.

Local Superintendents and board members from each county district continue to explore more educational opportunities to benefit our student population through shared services.

The elementary volunteer program, which was implemented in 2010/2011,

has expanded and we logged in over 4,000 volunteer hours in the elementary school during 2012-2013. This program has over 35 volunteers who help in the classroom. In addition we had volunteers come in and teach Junior Achievement, coach our Book Bowl teams, and many other activities. We are fortunate to have highly skilled, knowledgeable residents in our community who are willing to donate their time assisting the youth.

We continue to capitalize on the new facility that the taxpayers approved in 2009. The cooperative play this year was Bye Bye Birdie and was comprised of actors and actresses from Bear Lake, KND and Onekama, including our foreign exchange students. The performance played in our "state of the art" cafetorium and the production was as fine as any high school production, selling out all three performances. The community recreation center has also allowed many in the community to take advantage of the fitness center, indoor walking track and community recreation classes. We have added several new offerings and sections because of

Onekama Consolidated Schools has a long tradition of hosting foreign exchange students. Students from around the world have attended Onekama Consolidated Schools and they have had a positive impact on the dynamics of our traditional local student classroom. The experiences they bring from the other countries allows the students from the Onekama area to realize how large the world is and how different cultures vary. Conversely, it also allows our students to see that "kids are kids" and they share many common characteristics despite living thousands of miles apart. In 2013 we were fortunate to have six exchange students in our high school.


To comply with the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001, Michigan moved to a methodology in which a graduation rate includes only "on-time" graduates who earn regular diplomas within four years of entering high school. This calculation meets the guidelines provided by the National Governors Association (NGA) Graduation Counts Compact for the calculation of such rates. More than half the states have implemented the NGA standard as of December 2010. The formula for the calculation of 2013 graduation rates is possible because school districts have been tracking the enrollment of individual students since those students first enrolled in the ninth grade in the 2008-2009 school year, and have reported those data to the Center for Educational Performance and Information (CEPI). The gathering of this information at a statewide level allows CEPI to help districts track enrollments to reflect "transfers in" and transfers out" of the districts, as well as students who exit from the public education system itself, over the course of four years. With this in mind, the graduating class of 2013 was "on track" and has secured a 100% graduation rate from the State of Michigan.

There are many options for life after high school including on-the-job training, apprenticeship training, military training, certificate programs, associate degree programs, bachelor degree programs and beyond. All of our graduates fit into one or more of these categories.

Most importantly, the success of our district hinges on the support of our parents, students, community members, teaching staff and support staff. Our Staff has integrated modern technology, smart boards, internet, lap tops, distance learning, online courses, and virtual lessons into proven delivery techniques and embraced these technologies that are exemplified by our students' success. Fortunately, the district continues to move forward in difficult economic times and I am proud to work for, and be a parent of students attending an excellent educational institution.



Onekama Consolidated School students take part in AT&T MACUL Technology Showcase

LANSING — Sometimes seeing is believing.

The things students can do with technology is amazing and that point was well proven this year when four seventh grade students from Onekama Consolidated Schools had the opportunity to display their talents at the 12th Annual AT&T/MACUL (Michigan Association for Computer Users in Learning) Technology Showcase at the rotunda in the state capitol in Lansing.

Teachers Nikki Torrey and Naomi Kolehmainen accompanied students Jeremiah Torrey, Caleb McWain, Zoe Morley, Marissa Stebbins where they joined other students from around the state in putting on presentations.

"We have been taking students about 10 years to this showcase," Torrey said. "This year the students did a presentation called "It's All About Me" in which they used technology to create a biography about their lives. They students did it in an innovative way, using slides and filled in the details of what they like, dislike and where they want to go with their life.

"We took our presentations all about us down there," said Jeremiah Torrey. "What we did in the presentations was to tell about what we do in school like if we play sports, what our activities are that we take part in and about the things we are good or not good in doing."

McWain said they utilized the technology of Google Drive to create their presentation. It all came out of Kolehmainen's class where the students have the theme each month that they use to create a project. In the month of September it was the "It's All About Me."

"It took us about two weeks to create it," said McWain.

Students also had the opportunity to exchange ideas with the people who attended the showcase. There were 32 schools from all over the state who took part in the showcase this year, as well as officials from MACUL. It was a good opportunity not only to see what other schools are doing with technology, but to share some ideas.

Each year MACUL does this program that is underwritten by AT&T. The demonstration this year featured a wide variety of uses of technology in the

classroom such as students using iPads to show how student-created QR codes are used in library scavenger hunts; a Jeopardy-type game students developed to reinforce core subject matter; videos to encourage students to excel in math and one group of kindergartners showed how they blog using classblogmaster software.

Onekama students said that during the demonstration portion of the showcase they had many people view their exhibit.

"We showed our display to the president of MACUL and their board of directors," said Jeremiah Torrey. "There were also lots of students and teachers from all around Michigan."

The students put together between 12 and 19 slides on themselves that they showed in the presentation. All of them agreed they would do it again and that it was a very positive experience.

"They asked us questions and said it was cool," said McWain. "They also asked us what other types of technology we had in the classroom."

Fellow student presenter Morley agreed saying she would go back again if given the opportunity.

"It was fun," said Morley.

Torrey explained that the students have computers in their science and geography classes and they have smart boards in all of their classrooms throughout the day. There also some iPads that they use, but only in a limited capacity. "They also have the documented camera," said Torrey. "So, they use technology quite a bit. We have staff members that go to MACUL every year.

"The people at MACUL are very good to us. They contacted us again this year to ask if we have anyone who would like to do a presentation. Our seventh graders did a really neat project, so I can see us going again."

Torrey pointed out that they always have to know early in the school year

Change in Technology Administration

Onekama School transitioned from a local technology person to a county technology cooperative this year. It's more of a team approach sharing best practices and allowing for specialization. Bear Lake, KND, Casman Alternative Academy along with Onekama will be sharing a group of "techies" under the leadership of Roy Anciso, Manistee ISD Technology Director. MAPS will be participating on a limited basis.

Team members are at each district regularly and on demand as issues arise. This plan does allow for experts to be utilized in all districts involving duties that had been done independently in prior years. "This is a good thing for local schools and students throughout the county" says Bruce Peabody, retiring OCS Tech. Coordinator who remains at Onekama as part of the team one day a week during the transition period. "I am very excited to see the county go in this direction as it will be positive from an efficiency, expertise, and economic standpoint".

ONEKAMA — All of the students at Onekama Consolidated Schools gathered together Friday with one objective - to save some lives.

Onekama Elementary Celebrates March is Reading Month

McCarthy gave two presentations, to the Kindergarten through Second Grade, then to the Third through Fifth Grade students. The presentations focused on the writing process, and the steps an author takes to transform an idea into a finished piece of writing. Students will be able to apply what they learned as they work on writing their own original stories over the course of the month.

Throughout the month of March,

students will participate in a reading contest. For each 20 minutes that students read, they can fill out a paper fish titled "Reel in a Good Book" and enter to win a prize. On Wednesday, March 20, winners will be announced. Students will have the chance to win a fishing pole & reel combo, a FishingKids fishing vest, a FishingKids tackle box and compass set, a set of FishingKids books, and an Onekama Portagers sweatshirt.

On Friday, March 8, the school will host a book exchange called "Fishing for a Good Book." Students can bring in their used children's books in good condition. For each book they bring in, they can exchange it for a new book. The book exchange will take place in the Onekama Media Center.





COLLEGE & TECH PREP CLASSES

According to the new 2012 Michigan School Code, 9th-12th grade students are eligible to enroll in college level courses while still attending high school. Onekama Consolidated Schools in conjunction with West Shore Community College and Baker College will be offering courses over our interactive television system, or at the WSCC Manistee satellite campus at West Shore Medical Center. The following is a breakdown of the courses by names and the number of students enrolled in each course.

Typically, our students do very well in their dual enrollment courses. Most students receive 12-18 credits for college and approximately 90% of them are on the Dean's List at West Shore Community College. This percentage is based on the number of Onekama High School students enrolled in dual credit courses.

Class members will use a rotary cutter and mat, piece blocks and join them to make a table runner. We will learn to prepare the backing, batting and quilt top and quilt it on our machines using a walking foot. Preparing binding and attaching it will be demonstrated.
